We celebrated Seachtain na Gaeilge in the run up to St. Patrick's Day this year. It was a great week with lots of activities including a treasure hunt in Irish, Irish dancing with Ms. Phelan, Quizzes in Irish, Irish drama and announcements every morning in Irish. It was great to hear Irish being used around the school.

There was a concert on Thursday with lots of talent on show. Firstly, 12 children from the Naomh Mearnóg Comhaltas branch and three teachers (Mr. Maughan, Ms. Murphy and Ms. Dillon) played some traditional tunes on piano, fiddles and tin whistles. Then Don Murphy and his group from the Comhaltas sang some songs and played some tunes. They were joined by two past pupils, Leah Treitlinger and Cliona Dalton on bodhrán. The two girls explained how their bodhráns work and the showed the children the different sticks you can use to play them. There was a great atmosphere with children and teachers clapping and singing along. Ms. Kenealy led us in a rousing rendition of "The Rattlin' Bog". Lastly, three groups of Irish dancers from the school performed jigs and reels.

On Friday, we had our own St. Patrick's Day parade outside the school and St. Patrick himself paid a visit, much to the delight of the children. Mick the bagpiper escorted him around the yard playing traditional tunes. We then sang Amhrán na bhFiann to round off a great Seachtain na Gaeilge 2024. After the tour of the graveyard the children got to visit the interactive museum in the grounds which had lots of information about the history of the cemetery. Apparently, there have been over 1.5 million people buried there since it opened in 1832.

This was an excellent opportunity for Sixth Class to gain perspective on their studies of the 1916 Rising, The War of Independence and the Civil war.

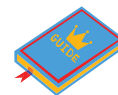
U 11 CAMOGIE VICTORY

Our swimmers competed well at the Leinster Minor School's Championships in the National Aquatic Centre in January. Kyla Connaughton qualified in the 50m freestyle and 50m back stroke for the Irish Minor School Championships in March. Filip Bottelier and Leon Niemczyk swam strongly in the breast stroke and freestyle races. Leon also competed in the 100m Individual Medley for the first time. He also qualified for the Irish Minor School's in the 50m freestyle, 50 breaststroke and 50m fly.
